

Puja Items A Complete Guide to Puja Samagri and Their Importance



Puja items is an important part of Hindu religious and spiritual life. It is a traditional way of expressing devotion, gratitude, faith, and respect toward God. Incense is commonly used during both daily prayers and special religious occasions. Dhoop and other traditional fragrant materials may also be used according to family customs.

5. Camphor

Camphor, or kapoor, is generally used during aarti. It produces a bright flame and is traditionally associated with purification and devotion.

During aarti, camphor is placed in an appropriate holder and lit safely before being offered in front of the deity.

6. Flowers

Fresh flowers are among the most common offerings in Hindu worship. They represent beauty, purity, love, and devotion.

Different flowers may be associated with different deities and traditions. Devotees generally choose fresh, clean flowers and offer them respectfully during the puja.

7. Fruits

Fruits are commonly offered as naivedya. They represent natural abundance and gratitude for the food and resources provided by nature.

Common offerings include bananas, apples, oranges, pomegranates, grapes, and seasonal fruits. After the worship, the fruits may be distributed as prasad.

8. Coconut

The coconut is an important item in many Hindu rituals. It may be placed on a kalash or offered directly to the deity.

The coconut is traditionally regarded as an auspicious offering and is commonly used during pujas, weddings, housewarming ceremonies, festivals, and other religious events.

9. Kalash

A kalash is a sacred vessel that is often filled with clean water and decorated with leaves and a coconut. It is generally placed in an important position during many traditional ceremonies.

10. Kumkum

14. Sacred Water

Water is an essential element of Hindu worship. Clean water is used for purification and various ritual offerings.

In some traditions, water considered sacred, such as Ganga water, is used. However, the specific type of water and its use depend on the religious practice being followed.

15. Panchamrit

Panchamrit is a traditional mixture of five ingredients. It is commonly prepared using milk, curd, ghee, honey, and sugar, although recipes can vary.

Panchamrit is used in several forms of Hindu worship and may be offered during certain deity rituals. After the ceremony, it is commonly distributed as prasad.

16. Betel Leaves and Areca Nut

Betel leaves and areca nuts, commonly known as paan and supari, are frequently included in traditional puja arrangements.

They are used as offerings in many ceremonies and may also be included in ritual preparations. Their use varies by region and tradition.

17. Moli or Kalava

Moli, also known as kalava, is a sacred thread traditionally used during many Hindu ceremonies. It may be tied around the wrist of a devotee as part of the ritual.

18. Puja Bell

Saraswati Puja

Hanuman Puja
